MISHNA GROUP DINNER, DECEMBER 15th

NEW SEFER TORAH WILL BE DEDICATED

A "Siyum," marking the completion of a tractate of the Talmud, and election of officers for the ensuing year, will highlight the annual dinner-meeting of the Beth El Ner Tamid Chevra Mishna, on Sunday evening, December 15.

The dedication of a new Sefer Torah, presented to the synagogue in honor of Mr. and Mrs. Michael Shapira by their children, will commence at six o'clock in the main sanctuary. A special dedicatory service has been arranged for the occasion. The addition of this new Torah Scroll will increase the number of Sifrey Torah held by the congregation to twelve.

Dinner will be served in Halevi Hall at 6:30 p.m., immediately following the synagogue service.

Members of the Chevra Mishna and their wives are cordially invited to attend.

CHANUKAH

The Festival of Hanukah commemorates the successful struggle for religious liberty, led by the priest Mattathias and later by his son, the brave Judas Maccabeus against the Syrian oppressors, in the year 165 Before the Common Era. The struggle culminated in a great victory for the Jews which ended in the recapture of the Temple in Jerusalem. The Temple was cleansed and rededicated to the service of God. The lights were rekindled in the Sanctuary. The Festival is known in the Hebrew as "Hanukah" which means "Dedication". It is also known as the "Feast of Lights" because the Hanukah candles are lighted each night for a period of eight nights in commemoration of this Feast of Rededication.

The candles are kindled in commemoration of the miracle which, according to tradition, occurred when the Maccabees rededicated the Temple.

ISRAELI TEACHER JOINS HEBREW SCHOOL STAFF

MISS CILLA GILON ASSUMES DUTIES DEC. 1

With the impressive growth in the enrollment of our Hebrew School, we have experienced a corresponding need for highly qualified and outstanding teaching personnel.

Cognizant of this fact, the congregation's Board of Trustees, acting upon the recommendation of the School Committee, headed by Mr. Max Braverman, has arranged for Miss Cilla Gilon, of Israel, to come to Milwaukee, for the purpose of teaching in our Hebrew School. Miss Gilon arrived here last week.

A resident of Israel, Miss Gilon was graduated from the Herzliah Gymnasium there. Having completed the course of studies prescribed for graduation by the Seminary for Kindergartens and Regular Teachers, she was licensed by the Department of Education and Culture of the State of Israel. She is also a graduate of the Department of Pedagogy, Division of Education, of the Hebrew University. Miss Gilon has taught in Israeli government schools for the past eight years.

The newest addition to our Hebrew School faculty has achieved distinction in various other avenues of endeavor. She was awarded first prize in a national essay contest dealing with the subject of the development of Jerusalem as Israel's capital. During her two years of military service in the Israel Defense Army, she was active as the assistant to the director of the Habima Art Theatre in charge

of dramatic activities in the army.

Miss Gilon has had considerable experience in group youth activities. Working under the Ministry of Education and Culture of the Youth Bureau, she served as counsellor in camps for school children during the past eight years. She has directed sports activities, dancing, singing, and dramatic presentations, and has written stories for children of school age.

Miss Gilon will be in charge of third and fourth grade Hebrew classes this year.

After cleansing the Temple and removing all of the idolatrous objects that had been used by the Syrians, one unpoisoned cuse of oil was found in the Temple, just enough oil (for burning) for one day. Yet, miraculously the oil burned for eight days. The miracle of the cruse of oil symbolizes the miracle of the survival of the Jewish people and Judaism through the ages. The Syrians who had adopted the culture of the Greeks, known as Hellenism, were not alone in their attempt to force their thought and religion upon the Jews. Nor were the Maccabees alone among our people in their struggle to resist such regimen. That our Fathers and we too have been able to maintain our identity and our Faith, despite the numerous attempts to annihilate us, is nothing short of a miracle.

Judah, the Maccabee, stands out as one of the greatest military leaders developed by the Jewish people. Since his name, the "Maccabee," was later applied to the whole movement, it is interesting to check the various explanations given to this word. Some say that the Hebrew letters in the word "Maccabee", stand for the first letter of the words "Mi Kamocho Ba-elim Adonai" (who is like unto Thee among the Gads, O Lord?) which was inscribed upon his banner. Another explanation is that "Makeb" means "hammer," which describes the characteristic determination of Judah.

Lest we be overly impressed with the victory of arms won by the Maccabees, the Haftorah chasen for the Sabbath of Hanukah, from the Book of the Prophet Zechariah reminds us "Not by strength and not by might, but by My Spirit, saith the Lord of Hosts". (Zech. 4:6.)

CHANUKAH IN YOUR HOME

1. OBSERVANCE

The celebration of Chanukah begins on the 25th day of Hebrew month Kislev (Tuesday evening, Dec. 17th) and lasts eight days. On each succeeding night of Chanukah, an additional candle is lighted, making eight in all.

2. KINDLING THE MENORAH

Place the Menorah in a conspicuous place in your home. If at all possible, have all the members of your family present at the ceremony of the lighting of the candles.

Light the "Shamash" candle first, and with it light first the candle on the left. Move toward the right. On the first evening of Chanukah, one candle is kindled. It is placed on the far right of the Chanukah Menorah, as one faces the Menorah. On the second night and on each succeeding night the candle for that particular evening which is to the left, is lighted first. Thus, on the last night of Chanukah, the 8th candle is kindled first then the 7th, and so on, moving toward the right.

On Friday evening, December 20th, the Chanukah candles are kindled before the lighting of the Sabbath candles.

Since the ceremony of lighting the candles is the most significant phase of the Festival, it should be observed in reverence and solemnity. The entire family should remain standing around the Menorah as the father lights the "Shamash." As this candle is held, the following blessing is chanted or recited: BORUCH ATOH ADONAY ELOHEYNU MELECH HAOLAM ASHER KIDESHANU BEMITZVOSY VEZIAVANUH LEHADLIK NER SHEL CHANUKAH. "Blessed art Thou O Lord our G-d, King of the Universe, who has sanctified us by His commandments and has commanded us to kindle the Chanukah lights."

Immediately following this "Bracha" the second benediction is recited, as follows: BORUCH ATOH ADONAY ELOHEYNU MELECH HAOLAM SHEHOSO NISM LAAVOSEY-NU BAYAMIN HAHEYM BAZMAN HAZEH. (Blessed art Thou O Lord our G-d, King of the universe, who per-

formed miracles for our forefathers in days of old at this season")

This additional blessing is said on the first evening only: BORUCH ATOH ADONAY ELOHEYNU MELECH HAOLAM SHEHCHYANU VEKIMONU VEHIGIANU LAZMAN HAZEH ("Blessed art Thou, O Lord our G-d, King of the Universe, Who has kept us in life and has preserved us, and enabled us to reach this season.")

After these blessings have been recited the first candle is lighted.
