PARENTS-TEACHERS COUNCIL MEETING JANUARY 29th

Parents of second and third grades of the Beth El Ner Tamid Hebrew School are requested to attend a Parents-Teachers Council meeting on Tuesday evening, January 29th, in the Kohl Hall. The meeting will open at 8:15.

Second in a series of four such gatherings scheduled for the current school year, the meeting on the 29th of January will afford parents the opportunity to meet with the Hebrew School teachers of the second and third grades and to discuss any matters relating to the progress of pupils, special problems, and the curriculum of the above grades. Rabbi Swiechkow will be on hand to present a general resume of the over-all school curriculum, its objectives, and basic educational philosophy. A special period will be set aside for parents to meet with the second and third grade Hebrew School teachers—Messrs. Irving Gendelman, Haim Kamner, Sam Silberstein, and A. Ben-Ari.

Since pupils of the aforementioned grades meet also on Saturdays, instructors of the Sabbath School Department for grades five and six—Mr. Max Weinschenk, Mr. Haim Kamner, Mrs. Pearl Katz, Mrs. Evelyn Roskin, and Miss Renee Goldman—will also be present to discuss the progress of students with parents.

Mr. Philip Zarem, Director of the Saturday-Sunday Departments, will discuss the curriculum of those divisions of the school, and will offer informative data on various aspects of the school.

FIRST MUSIC FESTIVAL.

On Sunday evening, February 17, the Beth El Ner Tamid Synagogue will proudly present its first Music Festival. Our Choir, under the direction of the renowned Max Janowski, will appear with soloists Cantor Paul Gewirz and Beatrice Horwitz.

Miss Horwitz, born in this country, spent the formative years of her childhood in Israel, during which time she made her first stage appearances as accompanist to her father, the noted Cantor Anshel Freedman, on his concert tours. Since returning to the United States, Miss Horwitz has been soloist with several leading Chicago synagogues, and is now a soloist at K.A.M. Temple and director of music at Beth Torah Congregation in Chicago. Her appearances on radio, television, and stage are numerous and well-known to synagogue and concert audiences throughout the Chicago area. In addition, she is a soloist on the newly released L.P. Album, "An Enchanted Evening with the Cantors," released by De Saymont Recordings, R.C.A. Custom Dept. Having been reared in the "Song Filled Household" of a Cantor, Miss Horwitz continues the family tradition with her glowing voice and sensitive interpretations. She has perfected that unique quality of voice and style which conveys the poignancy and rapture of Jewish liturgical and Israeli music.

Our Cantor, Paul Gewirz, who came here from Savannah, Georgia, was Cantor of congregations Ohev Shalom and Tifereth Israel in Washington, D.C., where he served eight years. The Cantor began his career at the age of eight when, as a child prodigy, he toured the country and conducted services in many synagogues. Since then he has been a concert and guest cantor, and has appeared on radio and television. His musical education was acquired under the personal direction of the outstanding masters in Hebrew liturgical music.

The choir will present moving, stirring music. Our congregants and their friends will be thrilled by their performance.

Tickets may be obtained from choir members or the Synagogue office at \$1.00 (donation). There will be a special student rate of 50c.

Milwaukee Host for Temple Bowling Tournament

This year, Milwaukee will host the sixth Annual Bowling tournament of the North Division Temples — Orthodox, Conservative and Reform. The tournament will take place at the Sports Bowl, 5814 W. North Avenue, on Saturday and Sunday, February 16 and 17, 1957.

There will be seven squads bowling — two squads on Saturday evening and five squads on Sunday afternoon and evening. SOMETHING TO THINK ABOUT

When a boy or girl becomes Bar or Bat Mitzvah it is, naturally, an occasion for much rejoicing in the family. Yet paradoxically, it is also the occasion when some of our most cherished purposes are jeopardized.

The first possible victim is the child's education. Of course, we wish to make of the day something outstanding memorable and significant. On the other hand, when we give this occasion the wrong kind of emphasis, the child is tempted to regard it as the climax of his training in Judaism. He "graduates" from the status of student and becomes an alumnus. This is injurious to him. Yet, we do not want to make becoming Bar Mitzvah a casual and unimportant event either. The difficult course we must follow is that of avoiding either extreme. If we are not careful, we can jeopardize his Jewish schooling.

The second possible victim is the child's sense of values. In school we try, from the beginning, to inculcate the power to discriminate between what is important and what is trivial, between the good and the merely glittering. Then comes the Bar Mitzvah party; and so often it neutralizes all that the school has attempted to teach. A formal dinner, with cocktails, at which much money is spent, impressing the guests with one's capacity to spend money, influences the child to believe that ostentation is better than modesty, and that money spent on elaborate entertainment is better spent than money on books, or charity, or the synagogues. Of course, some families manage to use their funds wisely, to include both. But the fact remains that the extravagant party does not help the child to understand clearly the values which the school — and ostensibly the parents prefer.

The third threat is to the service at the Synagogue. When relatives and friends, who do not generally attend the Synagogue (except for such occasions), converse loudly during prayers, visit and kiss each other conspicuously, sit with arms folded, not even glancing at a prayer-book, carrying large bundles of gifts, and otherwise desecrating the atmosphere of worship, they certainly do not add to the dignity and significance of the service.

It is the responsibility of parents to see to it that when their children attain the age of Bar or Bat Mitzvah, they do not allow the occasion to do more harm than good.

THE PLIGHT OF EGYPTIAN JEWRY

(The following excerpts concerning the disastrous situation of the Jews of Egypt are herewith presented. They are based on information appearing in the press during the past six weeks.)

Paris — Jewish refugees from Cairo have stated that Nasser summoned Chief Rabbi Nahaum and demanded that the Rabbinate order all Jews to wear a distinctive badge. The Rabbi refused, arguing that marking Jews would draw attention to them in the streets and make them liable to lynching, and that if the authorities wanted that, they must themselves assume the responsibility. The Chief Rabbi has offered his resignation several times, but the Egypt Government has refused this.

Paris — Jews arriving here by plane from Egypt confirm that expulsion orders have been issued to Jews in Egypt by the thousands. Not only foreign, but stateless Jews of Egyptian origin are being rounded up by the police, following the promulgation of a decree withdrawing Egyptian nationality from all Jews, thus rendering them stateless.

United Nations — Egypt has ordered 21,000 out of her total population of 50,000 Jews to leave the country within a period of 7 to 30 days, has imprisoned 1900 Jews who are being held as hostages, and has frozen Jewish assets amounting to more than \$100 m.

KEEP SOLOMON'S SEAPORT OPEN

(Reprint from the Milwaukee Journal, Editorial, 1/21/57)

Two strange new names now swim into geographic consciousness Ras Nasrani and Sharm el-Sheikh (as in shake). They are Arabic. Translated, they become Cape Nasromi and Harbor of the Sheik.

They are on the southeastern tip of the Sinai peninsula. The United Nations, in efforts to bring the Egyptian-Israeli crisis to an end, and forestall future ones, is debating what to do about them.

Ras Nasrani did not even exist as a name until 1949. Then the Egyptian government, working out of near-by Sharm el Sheikh, set six gun emplacements on the sandy spit.

The guns (six and three inches) controlled the narrow channel connecting the Red sea and the Gulf of Aqaba. It thus controlled sea traffic to Israel's port of Eilat at the head of the gulf. Eilat, then Ezian-geber, was King Solomon's seaport in biblical days.

The guns of Ras Nasrani, along with installations on Sanafir and Tiran islands in the straits, have been used to harass, and blockade, shipping bound to and from Eilat. This in spite of the fact that the Egyptian government, in 1950, told the American government that "it goes without saying that this passage will remain free as in the past in conformity with international practice and with the recognized principle of international law."

When Israeli forces entered Sinai in late October, they quickly seized Sanafir and Tiran and the Sharm el-Sheikh area. Although they have now retreated out of most of Sinai, they retain these holds, demanding of the UN that it provide guarantees against renewal of the blockade.

The Israeli stand seems reasonable.
