'Adventure in Africa'



**Murl Deusing
Famous
Photographer, to
Show Wildlife Films
at M.C. Meeting,
March 26th**

What a sensational program is in store for the Men's Club's next meeting of Tuesday evening, March 26, 1957. A program so good that the entire congregation is invited. Murl Deusing will be on hand—and what an entertainer he is!

Murl Deusing has become a nationally famous showman noted for his ability to narrate the film story. His beautiful timing brings out the dramatic impact of the film story and his charming wit delights the audience. He has been lecturing for the past twenty-five years appearing year after year on the top lecture courses in the country.

Murl Deusing's photography has brought him international fame. He has photography credits on four of Walt Disney Oscar awards

and on a winner of the Lion of St. Mark's Award in Italy. He is also noted as a producer of classroom teaching films. He is now Curator of Education on the staff of the Milwaukee Public Museum.

And now "Adventure in Africa." Here is real adventure! Four months and 10,000 miles of safari in the African wild and jungle search for wild animal stories for NBC's famous television program Zoo Parade.

Mr. and Mrs. Deusing visited strange places with strange names and ran the gamut of wildlife adventure. They photographed penguins and gannets on an island off the southern coast of Africa. They visited the famous training school for elephants and the collecting station for the rare okapi in the Congo. On the Serengeti Plains they covered the epic story of the migration of vast herds of wildebeests and for many days they lived with a pride of eleven lions recording their day to day activities. They captured giraffe and zebra, and made extreme closeup studies of wild elephants feeding and bathing. They photographed poisonous puff adder snakes and the spitting cobra in action. They faced the mad elephants of Addo and got closeups of a black rhino with a forty inch horn. On film, they got all this and much more—including the strangest story of all—lions using the cars of the tourists to stalk their prey and make the kill.

50,000 feet of motion pictures covering 140 species of animals were taken for Zoo Parade—enough to make ten half hour television programs. Murl Deusing has condensed the finest of this footage into a single lecture program, making one of the finest color films on wildlife ever to be presented on the platform.

This program should not be missed. It's much too good to be slighted. And so that everyone can take advantage of it, the Men's Club is inviting the entire congregation to attend. Yes, from eight to eighty, everyone is invited. So be sure to circle your calendar. Tuesday evening, March 26, 1957, Halevi Hall, at 8:15 p.m. I'll be there—will you??
