"THINKING ALOUD"

Upon completion of the regular ten-week session of the Synagogue's Institute of Adult Jewish Studies, which began in November and was concluded last month, it would seem appropriate to attempt an evaluation of our achievements in the realm of adult Jewish education.

From the standpoint of enrollment, this year's Institute was fruitful. Approximately 130 adults attended successive informal group sessions in these courses: Structure of the Jewish Prayer Book, Elementary and Intermediate Hebrew, and the Bible (Book of Genesis). The classes were highly successful in terms of regular attendance by enrollees.

To me, personally, this year's Institute was a special source of satisfaction and delight because of the interest evoked by the Bible class in a continuation of the study of our sacred literature after the formal close of the ten sessions originally allotted for the purpose. In response to the unanimous request that the study of the Book of Genesis be continued until June, the course in Bible has not been interrupted and will continue to be given on Tuesday evenings from 7:45 to 9:00 p.m., in the library.

This is a significant development. To most Jewish adults, the Bible has always appeared to be a "dry" subject. The fact that forty adults are anxious to continue the study of that Book, is an indication that the "Iron Curtain" of indifference has been lifted. This has proved to be a genuine reservoir of inspiration and satisfaction to me.

We are becoming more conscious, as a community, that a knowledge of Judaism is essential for Jewish parents. For the first time, an experimental spring session of the Milwaukee Institute of Adult Jewish Studies will be held at the Jewish Community Center on Thursday evenings, beginning with March 7th and ending May 23. Co-sponsored by the Bureau of Jewish Education and the Jewish Community Center, in cooperation with our own Synagogue and many other institutions of Milwaukee, courses will be offered in Elementary Hebrew, Great Jewish Books, and Jewish Life in America.

We strongly urge our congregants to take advantage of this rare opportunity to increase their knowledge and background of Jewish learning.

SCHOOL ESSAY CONTEST

Pupils of our Hebrew and Sunday School Department are eligible to enter the Annual Edith Nagle Essay Contest, sponsored by the Central Branch, National Women's League, United Synagogue of America, to take place February 20 to May 1, 1957.

Anyone of the following topics may be selected: Abraham, the Patriarch; David, the King; Akibo, the Scholar; Isaiah, the Prophet; Bialik, the Poet; and Galda Meir, the Statesman. Our guest speaker for the afternoon is to be Mrs. Hyman Israel, of Waukesha, presenting her program, "Dolls for Democracy." In charge of the "Dolls for Democracy" program in Wisconsin, sponsored nationally by the Anti-Defamation League of B'nai B'rith, Mrs. Israel presents programs to school children and adults, civic clubs, and church and synagogue groups. The programs try to bring about an understanding of differences among peoples of varying races and creeds.

Mrs. Israel has been active in the field of human relations for 10 years. In 1953, she was voted "woman of the year" in Waukesha by the Altrusa Club, and also won an award from the Waukesha Council of Churchwomen for her interfaith work and community service. She is a member of the advisory board of the child welfare committee of Waukesha county, a member of the board of the Wisconsin Welfare Council and of the Waukesha County Council for Child Welfare, a past president of the Waukesha County Council for Social Agencies, and their representative to the first governor's conference on problems of the aged. In addition, she is past president of the Sixth District of B'nai B'rith Women's Auxiliary. For 10 years, Mrs. Israel has devoted time to two Waukesha radio programs, one in the field of human relations, the other in the field of mental health. During the past year, she has also been radio chairman for the Waukesha League of Women Voters, and is a member of the women's board of the Wisconsin Branch, National Conference of Christians and Jews.

To us, as Sisterhood members, there is another exciting factor we discovered about Mrs. Israel. She is the daughter of our very own Mrs. Abe Goldberg.

Ten Pin Alley Bowling News

This reporter has consistently maintained that this is a pretty fast league. After analyzing the League Standing Sheet as of February 24, 1957, he has come up with some statistics. With the aid of my wife and three daughters (collectively, we have quite a few fingers and toes to make counting easier), I determine that the average team average is approximately 750. There are 79 bowlers registered in our league, and almost half of them have averages of 150 or better. Yep, there are 38 bowlers whose average is 150 or more. Leading the pack is —of course—Harold Ottenstein with a really tremendous 186. Jack Pollack is next on the list with a real good 183. In the third spot is Benny Klein's 180.

Back to statistics: We have three bowlers in the 180 and better class. We have 4 in the 170 plus class. Eleven have averages in the 160's. The 150's boast 20 members. The biggest percentage — 24 — are in the 140 and better status. The 130's have 8 constituents; the 120's own 5; and there 4 bowlers in the 110-or-better standings.

And speaking of hot bowlers, we have a new one this week. S. Naimon shot a tremendous 252 game to take over the number two spot in the Individual High Game series. In the top spot in that contest is Jack Pollack with a 256. Earl Rosen and Harold Ottenstein share the number three position with 243 games.

Jack Pollack's 647 is high in the three-game series department; Joe Steins' 627 is in second place; and Harold Ottenstein's 624 holds the third spot on the rung.

Modern Furniture's 930 has stood a long time as being the best in the Team Game Statistics. Banner Lumber and Sherman Delicatessen, with 920 each, share the runner-up spot.

The 2,602 series, rallied by Sherman Delicatessen, still leads the board. Banner Lumber's 2,528 is in second place; and the 2,525 shot by the Kendall Manufacturing Company team is in third place. Again, I insist, this is no slow league. (Classic league and All-Star bowlers, LOOK OUT!!)

The League Standing as of February 24, 1957 shows that the Kendall Manufacturing Co. team is still on top of the heap—by three points to be exact. Polly Prim is in second place 4½ points ahead of the Friedmans. Boris Furs is next, 3½ points behind the Friedmans, and just 1½ points ahead of the fifth-place Wiviott Shell Service team. Following along in order are Geller Steaks, Banner Lumber, Sherman Delicatessen, Kickerino's, Automatic Merchandise, Modern Furniture, and Lewis Realty.

Apparently, the race has settled down to the first three teams. The Kendall team has 65½ points; the Polly Prim has 62½ points; and the Friedmans have 57 points. These three team meet again during the last five weeks of bowling, and the standings could be completely scrambled. But that's what makes this game of bowling so interesting—it's so unpredictable! This race is going right down to the wire. Even though many teams have been eliminated from the championship lead, they are still tough enough to knock off the forerunners and make this race even closer than it already is. They are out every Sunday morning giving of their best. No matter who wins, everyone has a good time. And that, in the final analysis, is the main thing.
