### M. OKRENT TO RECEIVE "MAN OF THE YEAR" AWARD

On Friday evening, December 7, Mr. Morris Okrent, member of the Synagogue Board of Trustees, will formally be presented with a State of Israel Bonds award, in recognition of the outstanding service he rendered in connection with the Synagogue's recent Israel Bond Drive. Mr. Abe Skolnik will bestow the honor in his capacity as President of the Beth El Ner Tamid Synagogue, in behalf of the State of Israel Bond organization.

Through the dedicated and untiring efforts of Mr. Okrent, subscriptions in the sum of \$75,000 were obtained through a parlor meeting at his home in mid October; in addition, \$50,000 worth of Israel bonds were sold this month when the congregation sponsored a dinner honoring Mrs. Eleanor Roosevelt. The grand total of \$125,000 in Israel Bond sales, credited to our synagogue, has shattered all previous records at Beth El Ner Tamid.

### CHANUKAH PROGRAM FOR SUNDAY SCHOOL DEPARTMENT

Children will enjoy a full morning of activity, Sunday, December 2nd. Room parties, exchange of gifts, and an assembly program are being scheduled to give our children a very interesting and happy day.

We are fortunate in having the services of Cantor Paul Gewirz who, accompanied by Mrs. Lorraine Cohen, has been busy teaching the students songs every Sunday morning. In addition to accompanying Cantor Gewirz, Mrs. Cohen has been coordinating the efforts of our primary teachers in such activities as playlets, dances and games.

This year, she has arranged the Chanukah program which will include words of greetings from Rabbi Swichkow, the story of Chanukah pancakes by children of the first grades, a Chanukah game by the second grades, a group of Israeli dances by the third grades, and singing of children's favorite Chanukah songs by the entire assembly, led by Cantor Gewirz.

We are grateful to the Sisterhood for the Chanukah favors they procured for the Saturday and Sunday school, and to the members of the P.T.C., who will distribute them to the children.

Augmented with appropriate home celebration, we are sure the children will have a Happy Chanukah.

**"THINKING ALOUD"**

In the fabric of all societies, etiquette plays a significant role. Whether it concerns social or political conduct, etiquette demands that certain "do's" and "don'ts" govern the relationships between notions and men.

What is etiquette? Webster's New International Dictionary defines it as "the forms required by good breeding." Thus, in observing the practices of etiquette in our daily lives, it is assumed that they represent the best and highest qualities of reverence, refinement and dignity.

But etiquette is, by no means, limited to social or political life. It is especially important in maintaining the stature and dignity of the Synagogue. In Hebrew, we refer to this mode of conduct as "Derech erez," which, put into simple words "good taste." I am referring specifically to the question of whether women should wear hats when attending synagogue services.

"Good taste" would seem to suggest that attendance in a House of G-d merits a full measure of respect. This refers not only to general decorum, but also to being well dressed, with special reference to wearing a hat. Synagogue etiquette recommends to women adherence to this appropriate custom.

Our Junior Sabbath services, conducted every Saturday morning in Halevi Hall under the direction of Mr. Mox Weinschenk, and attended by approximately three hundred boys and girls, have grown and developed into a creative and fruit-bearing facet of our Hebrew School-Synagogue program. To observe the youngsters actively participate in the service and to hear the Torah reading by some of our Hebrew High School students, cannot but leave visiting adults deeply impressed and inspired.

During the past few months, something new has been added to enhance and give additional meaning to the services—the novel portrayals of the weekly Torah Readings by our "Parshe Players." One must admit that it is a difficult task even for adults to present, within a period of five minutes, in dramatic fashion the "Jist" of the Biblical portion that is read. And yet, that is what many of the members of our Hebrew High School Department, affiliated with LTF, have successfully done each Saturday morning! They have made a significant contribution by transforming the Torah Readings into "live" and realistic scenes.

Our best wishes to the Parshe Players for this remarkable and praise-worthy innovation — Rashalee Swickow, Eugene Ridberg, Eliot Dorff, Michael Stein, and Carol Rokito.

**CONVENTION HIGHLIGHTS**

Over 1500 delegates, representing 383 Sisterhoods, gathered at the Concord Hotel, New York, for the Biennial Convention of the National League of United Synagogue of America, November 11-14.

Many important issues were discussed, ideas exchanged, and fresh new thoughts brought back. Each morning the sessions were opened with a one-half hour prayer service led by Mrs. David A. Goldstein, Convention Chairman.

An additional hour each day was devoted to Torah Study, led by Rabbi David A. Goldstein of Philadelphia, Rabbi Max Kodushin of Riverdale, New York and Prof. Ernst Simon, Director of Education, Hebrew University, Jerusalem.

The Women's League voted to undertake the construction of a \$500,000 dormitory for women students at the Teachers Institute of the Jewish Theological Seminary of America.

One of the most important sessions of the convention was that which dealt with discussions on youth, led by Robbi M. Saltzman, who heads the United Synagogue Nation Youth Committee. He expressed concern over the problem of bringing the teen-ager back to synagogue activities. In part he said: "There is a need for teen-agers to belong to a group, to have a channel to express their views and to instigate new thoughts and emotions. What better place than in a Synagogue. Our hope of the future is in our youth—they need us and we need them."

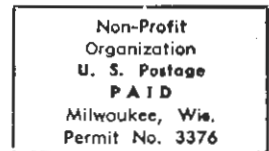
