CHALLENGE AND DECISION

Our High Holy Days have been frequently likened to an exalted mountain peak, rising high above the ordinary terrain of life. Because one is able to look down from those majestic heights and view with better vision and clearer perspective the valley which lies below, Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur have always inspired the Jewish people to utilize those solemn occasions of the calendar in a two-fold manner: to review the expiring year, and to chart, in the light of its experiences, an improved design of living for the future.

During the past decade, American Jewry has excelled in many areas of endeavor. The moral and financial contributions it has made to our brethren in Israel during the most crucial years of the young Jewish Republic's existence, constitute a glorious chapter in the story of the American Jew. The rapid development and consolidation of Jewish social service agencies and institutions, geared to serve the needs of the Jewish community in so many ways, are unmistakable indications of the process of maturity in operation in communal life. Even more impressive is the continued unparalleled appearance of hundreds of new and magnificent Jewish edifices of worship during the past few years. In addition to those erected in the late forties and early fifties and encouraging, indeed, is the new "high" in the membership rolls, in city and suburb, of congregations, representing all three Jewish "denominations." Above all, in contrast with the attempt to conceal one's "Jewish origin," a tendency that was prevalent less than a generation ago, today, the desire to be identified with the American Jewish community, particularly through the synagogue, stands out in greater clarity than ever before.

It is, however, in one area especially that a substantial measure of success is being effectively attained—**Jewish education.**

Seventy-three years ago the editor of the *American Hebrew* emphasized editorially that the school is the cradle of the community, and that ultimately a community is bound to take the form in which the school shapes it. History confirms the truth of that assertion. A generation ago, the most pathetic scene that met the eye was the "lost generation". They were the young people who had been denied the opportunities of learning basic Jewish cultural values and the "whys" and "wherefores" of Jewish beliefs and observances. Most tragic was their spiritual plight, for they groped in the dark, not knowing why they ought to remain Jews. American Jewry was compelled to face a supreme challenge—"converting Jews to Judaism!"

The decision was made. The "cradle of the community" would have to be strengthened. Jewish education would have to be rejuvenated, if American Jewry was to become a self-respecting, influential, bastion for Jewish survival. In the decade and a half, elementary Jewish education has come into its own. It has become a generally accepted prerequisite for Jewish maturity. Today, there is hardly a community that is not experiencing a notable and marked increase in student-enrollment. And, simultaneously, the launching of the offensive to regain the "lost generation" of parents through institutes of adult Jewish studies, has been most gratifying.

The recent history of our own synagogue Hebrew School offers ample evidence of the remarkable transformation that has come to pass within the short span of seven years. From an enrollment of about 100 in 1951, the number increased to 291 by 1956. It is not unreasonable to anticipate that within the next two years, our enrollment will embrace between 400 and 500 pupils, with girls constituting fifty per cent of the student body.

It is in this optimistic vein that we look forward to a culturally and spiritually-rich New Year. May the Author of Life grant all of us renewed vigor and fortified strength toward making Jewish living an inspiring and rewarding experience. L'Shona Tova Tikosyvu.

SEATS AVAILABLE

Seventy-seven seats in the Main Synagogue were acquired this past year by members. Many of our affiliates took advantage of a special provision that was adopted by the Board of Directors, permitting members to contract for seats on the main floor of the Synagogue in their desired price bracket, even though no seats were available in that particular category. Until such seats become available, they will be permitted to sit in temporary pews. Dues were in accordance with seats contracted for, with the exception of the \$125.00 seats, on which a new rate of \$85.00 was established.

About 25 more couples can still be accommodated on the main floor under the new temporary seating plan. Choice pews are very limited. The balcony can accommodate about 20 more couples.

If the interest shown by members in acquiring seats in the main Synagogue this year is equal to the tremendous response experienced last year, all seats should be accounted for and a waiting list established for all future seating.

BETH EL NER TAMID HEBREW SCHOOL

REGISTRATION FOR THE NEW TERM CLOSSES SEPT. 12th

ATTENDANCE: Pupils meet three times a week, two hours per class session — Monday, Wednesday, and Saturday, or Tuesday, Thursday, and Saturday.

CURRICULUM: Hebrew, reading and writing; Bible; Jewish History; Ceremonials; Prayers; and Junior Services.

FACULTY: Staff of seven experienced full-time instructors under Rabbi Louis J. Swickow, Hebrew School Director.

NOTE: At present, a minimum of four years of Hebrew School education is required for a boy or girl in order to become Bar or Bas Mitzvah in our Synagogue; a minimum of two years of Hebrew School training is required as a prerequisite for Confirmation. Such education must be obtained in a school recognized by the Beth El Ner Tamid Synagogue.

HIGH HOLIDAY SERVICES

Main Synagogue

Rabbi Louis J. Swickhow will conduct the services and preach the sermons in the Main Synagogue during Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur.

Cantor Paul Gewirz and the Synagogue Choir, under the direction of Mr. Max Janowski, will chant the liturgy on the Holy Days.

Halevi Hall

The Ritual Committee, headed by Mr. George Rosenberg, is delighted to announce that Dr. Arthur Hyman will conduct the High Holiday services and preach the sermons in Halevi Hall. Cantor B. Gelbert, who has chanted the services there for the past few years, will again officiate this year.



Rabbi Hyman is assistant professor of Jewish Philosophy at the Dropsie College for Hebrew and Cognate Learning in Philadelphia. He was ordained as Rabbi at the Jewish Theological Seminary of America, and holds the degrees of Ph.D. and M.A. from Harvard University. He has been the recipient of many academic honors, among them appointment as Faculty Fellow of the Ford Foundation's "Fund for the Advancement of Education."

In addition to his academic teaching and research, Rabbi Hyman has gained recognition for his work in Adult Jewish Education. A member of the governing board of the National Academy for Adult Jewish Studies, he recently served on the faculty of the B'nai B'rith Institutes of Judaism.

Having occupied leading pulpits in the New York area, Boston, Philadelphia, and Baltimore, Dr. Hyman has earned a reputation for his inspiring, informative, and thought-provoking sermons.

Those who have heard Cantor Gelbert's liturgical renditions have found delight in his talented voice and artistic interpretation of the prayers.

YOUTH SERVICES

High Holiday Services for children, ages 7 to 13, will be conducted in the Chapel and Kohl Hall under the direction of Messrs. William Kay, Max Weinschenk, Irving Gendelman, and Sam Silberstein. Youngsters who are 7 to 10 years of age will meet in Kohl Hall; ages 10 to 13, in the Chapel.

Yom Kippur: Friday evening, October 4—5:15 p.m.; Saturday, October 5—10:15 a.m.

These services have been designed for your children OVER THE AGE OF 7 AND UNDER 13. If your child is below the age of 7, PLEASE DO NOT BRING HIM TO THE CHAPEL OR KOHL HALL, since Nursery Service will be available during the Holy Days in rooms 1 to 5 in the school wing.

PRAYER BOOKS and SCULL CAPS

All male worshippers are requested to wear skull caps at the Holy Day services. These will be found in the Lobby, near the entrance to the Main Synagogue and Halevi Hall. The congregation will also provide each congregant with a copy of the High Holiday Prayer Book.

Since Prayer Books and Yarmulkes are the property of the Synagogue, members are requested to leave them at the Temple after the close of the service.

SYNAGOGUE ETIQUETTE

All of us are anxious to make the High Holiday services inspiring, decorous, and dignified. To achieve those aims, your Ritual Committee and ushers seek your cooperation in the observance of the simple rule of decorum and synagogue conduct.

Conversation is distracting both to those conducting the services and to your neighbors. Please refrain from all conversation, even in a whisper.

Bring your Tallith with you. Do not remove it until the services are over—after the benediction.

Male worshippers will be provided with skullcaps and with the "High Holiday Prayer Book." These are not to be removed from the synagogue.

Refrain from assembling or smoking in lobby, entrance, or corridors. Smoking is prohibited anywhere on Yom Kippur.

Do not invite guests to visit you during the services.

Read the schedule of services (printed on the reverse side of your membership card.) Come to the services as early as possible and remain in your seats until they are concluded.

No one will be seated during the following portions of the services:

1. During the Rabbi's Sermon;
2. While the Ark is open;
3. While the Shofar is sounded;
4. During Special Prayers.

Please cooperate with the ushers. If you happen to be a late-comer, abide by your usher's request—wait until he permits you to enter.

If your assigned seats are in the Main Synagogue please use the rear door to leave or enter; congregants worshipping in Halevi Hall are requested to use the center door (Main Lobby) to leave or enter.

Children should not be brought into the synagogue. Special youth services, have been arranged for them.

Jain heartily in the Hebrew and English responses and in congregational singing.

Occupy only those seats for which you can show tickets.

If all cooperate in the full observance of these regulations, indeed our services will be truly inspirational for each of us.

IMPORTANT — FOR YOUR INFORMATION**New Regulations Adopted Concerning
Bar and Bas Mitzvah and Confirmation**

Motivated by the desire to elevate the standards of Jewish education in the Beth El Ner Tamid Synagogue schools and to help foster an informed and better educated younger generation, the Board of Trustees, in April and June, 1957, adopted the following resolutions:

1) **BAR AND BAS MITZVAH**—Effective September 1, 1959, a child, in order to qualify for Bar or Bas Mitzvah in the Beth El Ner Tamid Synagogue, must enter a recognized Hebrew School at the age of 8, or upon entering the Third grade in the public school, whichever event occurs last.

2) **PREREQUISITE FOR CONFIRMATION**—Effective September 1, 1959, a minimum of three years of Hebrew School education shall be required for all candidates for Confirmation in our Synagogue.

3) **TIME OF CONFIRMATION**—Effective September 1, 1959, Confirmation shall take place at the end of the Tenth grade, or the average age of sixteen. Pupils entering the Sixth grade as of September 1, 1959, and all other grades below the Sixth thereafter, are included in this change.

Thus, beginning with September, 1959, no child above the age of 8 may register in our Hebrew School. A special beginners class will be instituted in February, 1959, for all pupils who will be 8½ or 9 years of age at that time. February, 1959, therefore, will present the last opportunity for children between 8 and 9 years of age to enter the Hebrew School.

With regard to Confirmation, the new rule increases the minimum prerequisite of Hebrew School training from two to three years.

Finally, beginning with 1964, Confirmation will take place at the age of 16, or at the end of the 10th grade. Confirmation at the present age of about 15, or the end of the 9th grade, will be continued until 1962. (There will be no Confirmation in 1963).

Yahrzeit Records

One of the many services which your synagogue offers to its membership is the annual reminder of Yahrzeit observance.

Our Synagogue office maintains a systematic record of Yahrzeit dates of departed relatives of the congregation. Yahrzeit notices are usually mailed two weeks in advance to relatives of the departed.

If you wish to be informed as to Yahrzeit, please notify our office secretary, giving the Hebrew or English date of departure and the relationship of the deceased. Call Hilltop 2-4520.

MEMORIAL TABLETS

To honor and perpetuate the cherished memory of departed relatives, many worshippers have provided for bronze memorial plates which have been mounted on Memorial Tablets, situated in the Chapel.

Memorial lights are kindled at each plate during Yizkar services and on respective Yahrzeits.

Sparkling clean, freshly pointed, and fully equipped classrooms await the opening of Saturday and Sunday school.

Children who are in the 4th, 5th, 6th, 7th, and 8th grades in the public school will report to their assigned rooms for their first session, Saturday, September 14th, at 9:15. Irv Silberman, out of the clouds and firmly set on terra-firma, is also celebrating with his wife Anne the coming of a new granddaughter . . .

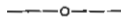

OUR YOUTH

One of the most important purposes of the Sisterhood is to cooperate in developing an effective Youth program for our young people, for we realize full well that our children represent our most precious possessions. It is our goal to help develop a generation of American Jews who will be devoted to Judaism, who will continue its democratic practices and spiritual traditions, and who will carry on the rich Jewish heritage which is their birthright.

The Sisterhood is recognizing the importance of this goal, allocates funds in its budget covering full or partial subsidies to send teenagers to Camp Ramoh or USY Conferences. Accordingly, this past summer two children enjoyed the unique experience of a summer of wholesome recreational and educational activity in the atmosphere of joyous and full Jewish living at Camp Ramoh in Conover, Wisconsin. The two girls, Leah Londe and Elaine Irwin, were selected by the members of the faculty of our Hebrew School on the basis of outstanding leadership qualities and scholastic achievement. The Men's Club also made two scholarships available to two boys—David Ticko and Donny Swickhow.

Sisterhood saw fit to make available four scholarship awards in the amount of \$50.00 each to interested members of the USY group to attend the USY Camp Institute held from Aug. 26th to Sept. 2nd. Two such awards were also presented by the Synagogue. Thus six of our young people were able to attend the Institute held at Camp Ramoh. The six young people receiving the scholarships were Shari Alschwong, Irwin Bard, Rochelle Gellman, Mark Levner, Sandra Shaw, and Marshall Zarem.
